Have someone in your group Luke 1:26-38

- What about this verse strikes you?
- What is the larger context of this verse?
- Put yourself in Mary's shoes for a moment. How would you have felt? What possible issues might arrive by her submitting to God's plan?
- What are some characteristics that Gabriel said this promised son would have?
- How does verses 32 & 33, speak of Jesus's role as a deliverer

GETTING PRACTICAL

- 1. What stood out to you about this week's message on this topic?
 - a. Why did you find that so impactful?

Jesus came to this world to deliver not only the Jewish people but all people from the weight and tyranny of Sin. Let's spend some time and make this personal to our life, discussing what his deliverance means for us.

- 1. What does God's deliverance mean for you in your life?
- 2. When you reflect on this past year where have you seen him deliver you from sin, hardship, ways of thinking, situations or in other ways?
 - a. Spend a moment as a group celebrating the gift that we have of deliverance in Jesus.
- 3. Where are you seeking deliverance for things yet unfinished?
- 4. Is there someone in your life that needs to know that Jesus came to bring the good gift of deliverance? How may God be calling you too share with them, support them, or pray for them?
